Nomination Process

Inductee eligibility is as follows: Athlete:

- Nominees must have represented sport with distinction in athletic competition; both in Saskatchewan and outside the province; or whose example has brought great credit to the sport and high respect for the individual; and whose conduct will not bring discredit to the SSHE.
- · Nominees must have compiled an outstanding record in one or more sports.
- Nominees must be individuals with substantial connections to Saskatchewan.
- Nominees do not have to be first recognized by a local satellite hall of fame, if available.
- The Junior level of competition will be the minimum level of accomplishment considered for eligibility.
- Regardless of age, if an individual competes in an open competition, a nomination will be considered.
- Generally speaking, athletes will not be inducted for at least three (3) years after they have finished competing (retired).

Builder:

- Nominees must have had a career which combines wholly or in part, the qualities specified for athletes (above) in such a way as to make their contribution to sport of an outstanding nature, and whose conduct will not bring discredit to the SSHE
- Nominees must be individuals with substantial connections to Saskatchewan. Nominees do
 not have to be first recognized by a local satellite hall of fame, if available.
- The term "Builder" should be defined to illustrate a variety of functions including coach, official, administrator, patron, media (journalist/broadcaster) and sports science and medicine.
- An individual honored as an athlete who then goes on to a career as a builder will not be considered for induction in the same sport.

Teams:

- Saskatchewan teams winning a national, international, or world championship, or reaching the ultimate level of achievement in their sport, and whose conduct will not bring discredit to the SSHF, may be eligible for entry into the SSHF.
- Nominees do not have to be first recognized by a local satellite hall of fame, if available.
- Generally speaking, in a sport where athletes compete in individual events the team will not be eligible for a team induction.
- The "Junior" level of competition will be the minimum level of accomplishment considered for nomination eligibility.
- · Regardless of age, if a team competes in an open competition, a nomination will be considered.
- Teams of a specific year should generally not be inducted for at least three (3) years after their accomplishment.

Each year the SSHF's Selection Committee reviews the nominations received and on file in order to choose approximately eight (8) athletes and builders and up to two (2) teams, in order to achieve a total of nine (9) to ten (10) inductees annually. At no time shall the induction of builders exceed the total number of athletes.

Nomination deadline is October 1st annually. Nomination forms can be obtained directly from the SSHF (306-780-9232) or downloaded from our website, www.sasksportshalloffame.com. Choose the Inductees link.

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Captain Edward Lyman "Hick" Abbott, CM/Bar

Edward Lyman "Hick" Abbott was known throughout Western Canada as a great athlete, a true sportsman and an exceptional person. Even today, many sports historians consider Abbott one of Regina's greatest athletes.

Originally born in Orillia, Ontario, Abbott moved to Regina at an early age and history was made. While in high school, Abbott excelled in a variety of sports including lacrosse, baseball, rugby, football, basketball and hockey.

Remembered across southern Saskatchewan as a speedy right winger who had a knack of putting the puck in the net, Abbott was at home on the hockey rink.

As a member of the Regina Shamrocks Hockey Club and the Regina Bees Capital Hockey Club, Abbott helped his teammates capture the Valkenburg Cup in 1911 and 1912, respectively, Saskatchewan senior hockey's provincial amateur championship.

The talented Abbott continued to enjoy success on the ice. He was a key member of the Regina Victorias when they became Senior Hockey Champions of Canada in 1913 and 1914 winning the Allan Cup.

Prior to enlisting in the military and heading overseas to fight in World War 1, Abbott piloted Regina to a western championship in rugby in 1915.

Abbott was also a true leader on the battlefield. He was awarded the Military Cross and an extra Bar for his bravery and gallantry in the field before his untimely death in August, 1918.

Close family friend, Joe Potts, found a way to preserve Abbott's memory and keep his name alive for generations to come by introducing the Abbott Cup for the Western Canadian Junior Hockey Championship.

Abbott was one of the finest athletes and best sportsmen in Regina. He will always be remembered as a true warrior and a man of character, both on the playing field and the battlefield.

Bob Bourne

Bob Bourne, a native of Netherhill, SK turned his outstanding amateur hockey skills into an exceptional junior hockey career and four Stanley Cup championships with the New York Islanders.

In his three seasons with the Saskatoon Blades, Bourne showcased his talent with 97 goals and 224 career points. Bourne's junior hockey exploits with the Blades were forever enshrined when his #12 was lifted to the rafters in 2005.

Bourne's effort and determination as a junior hockey star were rewarded as he was drafted by both the National Hockey League's (NHL) Kansas City Scouts and the World Hockey Association's Indianapolis Racers in 1974. Prior to the start of the 1974-75 NHL season, Bourne was traded to the New York Islanders.

Bourne, a member of the New York Islanders Hall of Fame, spent 14 seasons in the NHL with New York and Los Angeles. Bourne played 964 career games in the NHL netting 258 goals and 582 points. He was also a very instrumental part of the Islander dynasty as he recorded at least thirty goals per season three times and over twenty goals per season three other times.

His leadership was a key ingredient of the Islander teams that captured the Stanley Cup four consecutive times. Bourne led the Islanders in playoff scoring en route to their fourth Stanley Cup in 1983. Always a top playoff performer in his career, Bourne scored 40 times and assisted on 56 others for 96 points in 139 playoff games. In 1984 Bourne represented Canada as a member of the Canada Cup Team. He saw action in 8 games recording 3 assists.

Bourne spent the final two seasons of his NHL career with the Los Angeles Kings. In his final year in the NHL, he was awarded the Bill Masterton Trophy for perseverance. Bourne was also honoured by Sports Illustrated as one of several 1987 Sportsmen of the Year for his work with a school for disabled children.

After retiring as a player, Bourne spent five seasons coaching in the International Hockey League and Western Professional Hockey League.

Brian Clark

Brian Clark was an instrumental part of the Saskatoon Track and Field community. His association with the Riversdale Track and Field Club in Saskatoon began in 1969 and Clark devoted many hours to the development of the organization's young track athletes.

Clark, who acted as a coach, manager and fundraiser, was well known for teaching his athletes motivation and self-discipline on the track. He also showed them how these character traits would have a positive affect on all aspects of their lives. As a coach, Clark found success on many levels, always displaying commitment and a strong work ethic while helping to develop Saskatchewan athletes.

In addition to leading his athletes to great accomplishments at a local level, Clark coached many athletes at the Provincial level including the 1972 Saskatchewan Summers games held in Moose Jaw. He also assisted the University of Saskatchewan Huskies sprint, hurdles and relay teams from 1980 to 1989.

Clark, a national certified Level IV coach, was recognized for his efforts as he was named Saskatchewan's head coach in two Western Canada Summer Games (1975 and 1979). He was also Team Saskatchewan's head coach in four Canada Summer Games including 1977 in St. Johns, Newfoundland, 1981 in Thunder Bay, Ontario, the 1989 games in Saskatoon, and 1993 in Kamloops, British Columbia. At the 1975 Canada Summer Games in St. John, New Brunswick, Brian served as the sprint/hurdles and relay coach for Saskatchewan. The following year Clark was a coach for the 1976 Olympic Trials in Montreal.

On a national level, Clark coached the Canadian Junior team in sprint/hurdles at the 1978 Pan Am Junior Games in Sudbury. In 1980, he coached the Canadian Hopefuls team who competed at meets in France and England. One of the highlights of his coaching career took him to the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles as the hurdle coach.

For his dedication to sports, Clark was awarded the 1980 Sask Sport Volunteer Award and named one of the top 100 sportsmen in Saskatoon's centennial year (1982). Clark was inducted into the Saskatoon Hall of Fame in 1991. He was also inducted as part of the 1984/85 and 1985/86 University of Saskatchewan Women's National Champions track teams in 2003.

Jacqueline Lavallee

For Jacqueline Lavallee one sport was not enough. During her youth her natural athletic talents took her to the Saskatchewan Summer Games as a member of the track team in 1992, the Western Canada Summer Games in 1995 with the basketball team, and the 1997 Canada Games in soccer. After leading Holy Cross High School to two provincial soccer titles, Lavallee became a two-sport star with the University of Saskatchewan in soccer and basketball.

On the soccer pitch, Lavallee was named a Canada West all-star midfielder twice (1999 and 2001) and All-Canadian in 1999. Lavallee added to her trophy case in basketball where she was a three-time Canada West all-star point guard (1997, 2000 and 2002) and an All-Canadian in the 2001-2002 season.

As a senior, she had a remarkable final season on the basketball court as she finished second in Canada West scoring and ranked third nationally. For her efforts, Lavallee received the Tom Longboat award in 2000, recognizing outstanding aboriginal ability. She was also awarded the National Sylvia Sweeney award in 2002 and named a CIS Top 8 Academic All-Canadian.

In addition to a great career with the Huskies, Lavallee had the opportunity to play internationally for Canada in three tournaments and twice at the World University Games in 1999 and 2001. She also was a member of Canadian National Basketball team from 2002-2004.

Known as a cerebral player who had a keen understanding of game strategy, moving into coaching was a natural progression for Lavallee. Following graduation, Lavallee joined the Huskie basketball team as an assistant coach. With encouragement from Huskie's head coach Lisa Thomaidis, Lavallee left the team during the 2003-2004 season to play Division 1 professional basketball in Germany.

While playing in Germany, Lavallee had the unique opportunity to play in the Euro-Cup, which saw her play across Eastern Europe.

After her season abroad, Lavallee returned to her Saskatchewan roots and re-joined the Huskie women's basketball team as an assistant coach.

As a person who strives for excellence in everything she does, Lavallee has taken her coaching expertise beyond the University of Saskatchewan. In 2010, she took her talents to the international scene once again as she was named the head coach of the Canadian national under-17 "Cadet" women's basketball team.

Lavallee has been recognized for her athletic accomplishments with inductions into the Holy Cross High School Wall of Honour, the Saskatoon Sports Hall of Fame (2008) and the University of Saskatchewan Wall of Fame (2011).

Keith Magnuson

Wadena's favourite son, Keith Magnuson, is also one of the Chicago Blackhawks most memorable defensemen.

Magnuson's journey to the National Hockey League (NHL) began in 1964 when he joined the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League's Saskatoon Blades. After one season, Magnuson made a bold move and jumped to the University of Denver to play with his best friend, Cliff Koroll. Together the two future NHL teammates led the Pioneers to National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) championships in 1968 and 1969.

Magnuson, who was chosen as a NCAA all-star during his final two college campaigns, realized his boyhood dream of playing in the NHL when he signed a free agent contract with Chicago in 1969.

The fiery defenceman would become a stabilizing factor on the Blackhawks blue line for many years. Magnuson, who played in the 1971 and 1972 NHL All Star games, is best known for his leadership and his willingness to defend his teammates. During his NHL career, the former Chicago team captain played in 589 games and amassed 1,442 career penalty minutes, second most in team history.

At the time, Magnuson's aggressive style of play characterized the spirit of Blackhawk hockey, which was greatly appreciated by the fans. As tough as Magnuson was to play against, he was always a gentleman off the ice and would stay late after games to sign autographs for fans.

Magnuson's rough and tumble play took its toll on the veteran blueliner and a knee injury in 1979 forced him to retire. His career in Chicago continued as Magnuson became an assistant coach before being hired as the Hawks' head coach in 1980.

After leaving the bench, Magnuson helped establish the Blackhawks alumni association while making many appearances on behalf of the team.

In December 2003, at the age of 56, Magnuson tragically passed away in an automobile accident while returning from the funeral of former NHL player, Keith McCreary.

A banner with his name and his retired number 3 was hung from the rafters at the United Center in 2008.

Claude Petit, C.M., S.O.M.

Claude Petit is not only a distinguished serviceman and athlete, but also a role model for the First Nations community. Born in Duck Lake in 1935, Petit kept his focus on Saskatchewan boxing circles, quickly becoming well known within them. Youth in Saskatoon, Regina, Prince Albert, IIe-a-La Crosse, Green Lake and Meadow Lake all benefited from Petit's boxing clubs.

A veteran of the Canadian Armed Forces and a member of the Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry, Petit was a five-time Canadian Army Heavyweight Boxing Champion (1958-1963). As well, in 1964 Petit became the only Canadian to win the British Army Heavyweight Boxing Championship. His military in-ring accomplishments earned him a place on the Canadian Forces Sports Hall of Fame Honour Roll.

As an amateur boxer Petit was a four-time winner of the Edmonton Golden Gloves, as well as the Vancouver and Billings, Montana Golden Gloves.

Petit shared his love of boxing with youth and was instrumental in the positive growth of boxing in Saskatchewan by his development of coaches, referees and judges. His dedication to the sport had a consistent theme, the safety of the athlete.

As a Level V coach, Petit coached Team Canada at international competitions in Denmark (1989) and France (1990). In 1993 as a Level IV official, Petit worked at the first North American Indigenous Games held in Saskatchewan which were hosted in Prince Albert.

It was Petit's drive, determination and leadership that resulted in Saskatoon hosting the 1991 and 1994 Canadian Amateur Boxing Championships. Because of this drive, Petit served nine years as president of the Saskatchewan Boxing Association.

In addition to his dedication to boxing, Petit was a key leader in the aboriginal community. He played an integral role in creating a monument to Aboriginal veterans in Ottawa as well as an Aboriginal Veterans Millennium Medal. Petit also founded the Western Canadian Native Minor Hockey Championships.

For 23 years Petit was a key member of the organizing committee for Back-to-Batoche, Saskatchewan's well known Métis celebration. For his outstanding contributions to the community, Petit received the Order of Canada in 1998 and the Saskatchewan Order of Merit in 2002.

Randy Bryden Mixed Curling Team

Saskatchewan is known for producing great curlers. The 1996 Randy Bryden rink was no exception. This group was a perfect example of the determination and work ethic needed for success on the pebbled ice.

For the Bryden Rink, the road to the Unitel Mixed Canadian Champions started with winning the single spot out of Regina to represent Zone 7 in the high level competition at the Saskatchewan provincial finals. This foursome was unique with brothers, Russ and Randy Bryden playing alongside sisters, Cathy (Inglis) Trowell and Karen Inglis.

Bryden skipped his rink to a fourth place finish in the Provincial Imperial Oil Mixed Competition eight team round robin. The Bryden foursome went on to win their two playoff games and claim the Saskatchewan Mixed Curling Championship.

At the Unitel Mixed Canadian Championship in Charlottetown, Bryden and his rink sailed to a first place finish in the round robin with a 9-2 record. In the Page playoff, Saskatchewan met second place Ontario. Team Ontario stole a tenth end deuce to send them into the final.

Bryden and his team regrouped in the semi-final and defeated B.C. 6-4 by stealing a point in both the ninth and tenth end. The victory set up a rematch with Team Ontario for the Canadian Mixed Championship bragging rights.

The championship match was a classic with the lead changing hands several times. Ontario grabbed two in the tenth end to send the game into an extra end. With the hammer, Bryden scored two and Saskatchewan curling history was made.

With the 8-6 victory over a tough Ontario team, this talented group of curlers won Saskatchewan's fifth mixed title since the championship was created in 1964. The win, which was Randy Bryden's first national championship, ended Saskatchewan's 12-year drought at the Canadian Mixed Championships.

In addition to winning the championship, the Bryden brothers also made the Unitel all-star team.

2001, 2002 & 2003 Saskatoon Hilltop Football Club

For three consecutive seasons, the Saskatoon Hilltops dominated Junior Football in Canada. From 2001-2003 the Hilltops captured three Conference Championships and three Canadian Bowl titles.

During the 2001 campaign the Hilltops finished the Prairie Junior Football Conference regular season with a 6-2 record before rolling through the playoffs with victories over the Edmonton Wildcats and the Edmonton Huskies. The Hilltops overcame adversity in the final against the Huskies. Down 13-7 with only 2:12 left on the game clock, the Hilltops scored a late fourth quarter touchdown to move on to the Canadian Bowl. The Hilltops faced the Okanagan Sun in the Canadian final and came away with a convincing 45-11 victory. Hilltop quarterback Garett Olver threw four touchdown passes earning the game's outstanding player award, while Gabe Mackasey was voted the game's outstanding defensive player.

The 2002 version of the Saskatoon Hilltops continued their on field success finishing the season with a 6-2 record. A playoff victory over the Regina Thunder placed the Hilltops and Edmonton Huskies in the final again. Saskatoon won 19-18 making it the second straight year they'd beaten Edmonton by a single point in a come from behind victory in the final.

With the Hilltops offence gaining 534 yards and using six different players to score touchdowns, Saskatoon beat the Okanagan Sun 55-9 in the Intergold playoff game.

The Hilltops then needed a big second half performance to overcome a 14-8 deficit to beat St. Leonard Cougars 20-18 for their second Canadian final in two years. For his on-field efforts, Gabe Mackasey was chosen as Canada's outstanding defensive player for the season.

The Hilltops 2003 season was special as they finished the year undefeated. After leading the Prairie Football Conference with an 8-0 record, the Hilltops defeated the Edmonton Wildcats in the league semi final and the Edmonton Huskies in the final for the third consecutive year.

The St. Leonard Cougars were the Hilltops next playoff victim in the national semi final. Saskatoon then dominated the Victoria Rebels in the Canadian Bowl in Chilliwack. With an overwhelming 59-0 win, Saskatoon became only the fourth team in Canadian junior football history to win three consecutive national championships. In addition to being crowned National Champions, Hilltop stars Bret Thompson, offensive MVP, and Tyler Baier, defensive MVP, were honoured for their play.

The Hall of Fame was established to honor outstanding Saskatchewan athletes, championship teams and sport builders, as well as preserving the history of Saskatchewan sport.

History at a Glance:

• 1966 – the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada-Saskatchewan Branch and the Molson Brewery partnered to form the Molson Sports Hall of Fame. Located in the Molson's Hospitality House (Dewdney Avenue)

• 1974 – renamed the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame (SSHF) as they joined the Sask Sports groups on South Railway Street

• 1979 – the SSHF relocated to the current location at 2205 Victoria Avenue (the old Land Titles building which is designated as a Heritage property)

• 1981 – incorporated under the Non Profit Corporations Act

About Us:

• There are 498 inductees in the Hall of Fame (including 2014 inductees)

- 220 athletes 156 builders 122 championship teams
- 53 sports are represented in the Hall of Fame.

• Our collection contains approximately 12,000 sport artifacts and archives

• In 2013 over 1400 volunteer hours allowed the SSHF to partner in local activities, host events and maintain our collection

• Each year 1000s of students from around the province receive tours developed to promote awareness of Saskatchewan athletes and sports.

"We Are Changing" Will Become "Our Strategic Plan":

The SSHF developed a Strategic Plan in 2011 to guide us through future changes and development. We have implemented several initiatives: rebranding/new logo, a new website, an electronic Collections inventory, a revised exhibit strategy and schedule, as well as the addition of social media (Facebook, Twitter). For the past two years we have undertaken a project to digitize our collection through photos of artifacts and scanned images of archival material. The digitization of our collection will allow us to provide more information to the public going forward.

Funding:

Funding for the SSHF is currently provided by the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund and fundraising events managed by the SSHF, as well as the Sports Investors Club which was introduced in 2012. Money earned through fundraising initiatives is used to support the ongoing preservation and conservation of the collection as well as the development of education programming and exhibits.
